

**MINUTES**  
*Town of Lexington*  
**Executive Session and**  
**REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING**  
**March 4, 2013**

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Town Council held an Executive Session at 5:30 p.m. followed by a Regular Council Meeting at 6:30 p.m. on March 4, 2013 in the Eli Mack Sr. Room and Council Chambers. The meetings were attended by: Mayor Randy Halfacre, Mayor Pro-Tem Hazel Livingston, Council Members Kathy Maness, Ted Stambolitis, Danny Frazier, Todd Shevchik and Steve MacDougall. Staff members present were: Town Administrator Britt Poole, Assistant Town Administrator Stuart Ford, Town Prosecutor Cliff Koon, Police Chief Terrence Green, Director of Planning, Building and Technology John Hanson, Community and Economic Catalyst Johnny Jeffcoat, Utilities and Engineering Director Allen Lutz, Finance Director Kathy Roberts, Director of Parks, Streets and Sanitation Dan Walker, Events and Media Coordinator Jennifer Dowden, IT Manager Josh Emory, Assistant Municipal Clerk Karen Hanner, and Municipal Clerk Becky Hildebrand.

There were approximately forty (40) citizens present for the Council Meeting and two members of the news media.

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**EXECUTIVE SESSION REPORT**

Mayor Halfacre reported that the *Executive Session* was called to order at 5:30 p.m. after a motion was made by Councilmember MacDougall and seconded by Councilmember Stambolitis to go into *Executive Session*. The motion was unanimously carried by all those present. (Councilmembers Shevchik was not present for the vote.) Council adjourned from *Executive Session* at 6:10 p.m. after a motion was made by Councilmember MacDougall and seconded by Councilmember Shevchik. The motion was unanimously carried. Mayor Halfacre reported that Council met in *Executive Session* to discuss: one routine personnel issue regarding an Assistant Municipal Judge reappointment; one contractual issue and two legal updates. No vote was taken. A motion was made by Councilmember Maness and seconded by Councilmember Frazier to ratify Mayor Halfacre's *Executive Session* report. The motion was unanimously carried.

**INVOCATION, PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE AND CALL TO ORDER:** Mayor Halfacre welcomed everyone to the meeting and introduced the Council Members. He later introduced Mr. Ben Mauldin, Interim Executive Director for Central Midlands Council of Government. Pastor Jay Gamelin, Pilgrim Lutheran Church, gave the invocation. Mayor Pro-Tem Livingston led in the Pledge of Allegiance. Mayor Halfacre called the meeting to order at 6:35 p.m.

**DELETIONS/ADDITIONS**

Mayor Halfacre requested that one addition to Presentations be made regarding a Resolution supporting “Emma’s Law”. He added that there were no deletions from the agenda.

There being no objections, the Resolution was added to Presentations.

**APPROVAL OF MINUTES:** A motion was made by Mayor Pro-Tem Livingston and seconded by Councilmember Maness to approve the minutes from Council’s Special Council Meeting and Council Work Session, both held on February 19, 2013. The motion was unanimously carried.

**PRESENTATIONS**

1. **Presentation of Snow Ball Dance Check to the Chris Myers’ Children’s Place – Events and Media Coordinator Jennifer Dowden:** Ms. Dowden stated that the Town had revamped the Snow Ball Dance this past December and funds raised from the sale of tickets were awarded to the Chris Myers’ Children’s Place. Ms. Dowden presented a check in the amount of \$2,460.00 to Ms. June Fusco, Executive Director. Ms. Fusco thanked the Mayor, Council and the Town for their contribution. She stated that the Chris Myers’ Children’s Place opened two years ago and she has told many people that it would not have been possible in any other community but Lexington, South Carolina. She added that their mortgage is now approximately 98% paid and they now have money in the bank thanks to the many volunteers. She stated that they are not just a homeless shelter, but a place where people can get back on their feet.
2. **American Engineering Consultants – Mr. Thad Pope, Vice-President of Business Operations and Marketing:** Mr. Bill Bingham and Mr. Kenny Bingham presented two awards to the Town for their part in the City of Cayce, Town of Lexington and Joint Water and Sewer Commission Wastewater Treatment Project. Mr. Bill Bingham thanked the Town for allowing them the opportunity to work on the project, which resulted in their firm winning two engineering awards. They were judged to be the best project in South Carolina among all projects submitted. He added that their State award would now be entered into the National competition. They were informed last week that they had also won the runner-up category in the National Environmental Competition.

Mayor Halfacre thanked Mr. Bingham and added that the Town had also won a national award with the partnership project through the National League of Cities. He added that a big part of winning was due to the Town forming a partnership to help the overall region.

Councilmember Maness wished to thank Mr. Bill Bingham for his work on the Lexington School Board and she thanked Representative Kenny Bingham for all he

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has done for teachers in the State House. Councilmember Maness added that Representative Bingham was in charge of the budget and he had made sure that our schools were fully funded and wanted to publicly thank him.

3. **Proclamation of March for Meals Month – Councilmember Ted Stambolitis:** Councilmember Stambolitis read a Proclamation declaring March as “March for Meals Month” in the Town of Lexington. He thanked Lexington’s Meals on Wheels for all they do for elderly citizens. He added that they had recently lost some funding which made it very important to support them. Ms. Donna Neel, Fundraiser Coordinator, accepted the proclamation and thanked the Mayor and Council. (Copy attached.)
4. **Proclamation Recognizing the 300<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration of the Town of Lexington, Massachusetts – Councilmember Kathy Maness:** Councilmember Maness read a Proclamation honoring Lexington, Massachusetts on their 300<sup>th</sup> anniversary. She added that Lexington, South Carolina is proud to share this historic name. She stated that the Proclamation would be mailed to Lexington, Massachusetts.
5. **Presentation of Awards to Lexington Police Officers – Police Chief Terrence Green:** Chief Green and Major Koon presented the following officer recognitions:

Patrolman Earl Alewine – Medal of Valor  
Corporal Earron Sturges – Chief’s Letter of Commendation  
Patrolman Robert Besenyi – Chief’s Letter of Commendation  
Patrolman Dustin Currier – Chief’s Letter of Commendation

Chief Green stated that on February 14, 2013 at 12:41 a.m. Lexington Police Officers were dispatched to a fire at Chimney Ridge Apartments. Patrolman Alewine was the first officer on the scene where he encountered heavy black smoke from the rear of the building. As he approached Building 400 he saw black smoke coming from a bedroom in apartment 104. As he stood outside he could see the bed engulfed in flames and the victim, Ms. Cynthia Bair, sitting on the bed. Without concern for his own safety, he entered the apartment and found Ms. Bair in a state of shock and suffering from smoke inhalation. Suffering from smoke inhalation himself, Patrolman Alewine was able to remove Ms. Bair from the burning apartment and place her in a safe location. Ms. Bair suffered minor burns and smoke inhalation which required medical treatment. Patrolman Alewine was having difficulty breathing, but reentered the building to help evacuate others from the apartments. The courageous actions of Patrolman Alewine that night saved the life of Ms. Bair. Chief Green stated that for the first time in the history of the Town of Lexington Police Department, they issued a Medal of Valor, which is awarded to an Officer during the performance of his duties; risking his life while sustaining no serious injury, to save the life of another individual. Mayor Halfacre assisted with the presentation.

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Chief Green also recognized Corporal Earron Sturges, Patrolman Robert Besenyi, and Patrolman Dustin Currier for their outstanding service. He added that when these officers arrived at the Chimney Ridge Apartment fire they escorted many residents from the building through the smoke and flames. Mayor Halfacre assisted with the presentations. Mayor Halfacre added that these presentations are representative of what the Police Department brings to the Town of Lexington.

6. (Added.) **Resolution in Support of Emma's (Longstreet) Law, Senate Bill 137 – Councilmember Todd Shevchik:** Mayor Halfacre stated that the Town Council wants to support this law which has passed the Senate and will now go to the House of Representatives. Councilmember Shevchik read the Resolution which supports Senate Bill 137 which would require the installation of ignition interlock devices on repeat and first-time offenders of driving while under the influence. The Bill was introduced in memory of Emma Longstreet who lost her life when her parent's car was struck by a drunk driver on New Year's Day 2012. Mr. and Mrs. David Longstreet and their three sons were present to accept the Resolution. Mr. Longstreet individually thanked the Councilmembers for the many ways that had supported his family during the past year. He added that this Bill is possibly one of the toughest DUI Bills in the nation in that the current BAC level is .12 and fifteen states are at .15. He asked for continued support of this Bill which would be a tough battle to get passed. Mr. Longstreet stated that the Town of Lexington Police has had an increase in the number of DUI tickets which went from 80 to 235 in one year and the number in the County was 1,395. He thanked the Mayor and Council for their support. He distributed purple bracelets with Emma's name in support of Bill #137.

Mayor Halfacre thanked the Longstreet family for coming to the meeting and for introducing Bill #137. He thanked Councilmember Shevchik for leading the charge for the Town's Resolution in support of the Bill. He added that the Resolution would be sent tomorrow to Representative Kenny Bingham and the Lexington County Delegation.

**VISION PLAN UPDATE**

Mayor Halfacre gave an update on the Town's Vision Plan: (1) The Downtown Commercial Façade Program recently awarded five \$5,000 grants to businesses on Main Street. The five projects collectively will cost \$445,000, a wonderful return on a \$25,000 investment. If the budget adjustments are approved tonight, the Town will fund two more \$5,000 awards. He would like to see this amount doubled in next year's budget. (2) The I-20/Sunset Boulevard Beautification Interchange's final plans are under review for approval by SCDOT to install the Town's first "front porch". It is a \$620,000 project which will transform the corridor into Lexington. The project is a partnership with Lexington County and the Lexington Beautification Foundation.

**TRAFFIC UPDATE**

Mayor Pro-Tem Livingston provided an update on the Town of Lexington's continuing efforts to improve traffic. (1) The Traffic Committee requested that SCDOT conduct a speed study at Old Cherokee from SC 6 to Pilgrim Church Road. (2) The Traffic Committee will review the results of the St. Stephens Pre-School Traffic Safety Audit at their next meeting. (3) Phase I is under construction and is approximately 15% complete. Many citizens have called regarding the large trees that were removed. Mayor Pro-Tem Livingston stated that this is unfortunately the price to improve the traffic. She assured citizens that Town Council would do everything possible to plant more trees and add several green spaces. Mayor Pro-Tem Livingston asked if anyone has any traffic issues to please contact 359-1027. The next Traffic Committee meeting will be held on March 19, 2013 at 8:00 a.m. in the Eli Mack, Sr. Room.

**PUBLIC HEARINGS**

Mayor Halfacre called the Public Hearing to order and requested that those wishing to speak limit their comments to five minutes.

1. An Ordinance Annexing 169 and 179 Industrial Drive (TMS #005498-05-004 and TMS #005498-05-015).
2. An Ordinance Approving Mid-Year Budget Adjustment.
3. An Ordinance to Lease Lexington Square Property.

There being no comments, Mayor Halfacre declared the Public Hearings closed.

**OLD BUSINESS**

1. A motion was made by Councilmember Frazier and seconded by Councilmember Shevchik to approve **Final Reading of an Ordinance Annexing 169 and 179 Industrial Drive**. The motion was unanimously carried.
2. A motion was made by Councilmember Shevchik and seconded by Councilmember MacDougall to approve **Final Reading of an Ordinance Approving the Mid-Year Budget Adjustment**. Mayor Halfacre stated that it includes the two additional Façade Program awards. The motion was unanimously carried.
3. A motion was made by Councilmember MacDougall and seconded by Mayor Pro-Tem Livingston to approve **Final Reading of an Ordinance to Lease Lexington Square Property**. Mayor Halfacre questioned why the Town had to give a 10 day notice to hold an event, but the County did not. Town Administrator Poole stated that he did not foresee any issues in dealing with County Administrator Mergo. He added that the reading could be delayed to add an amendment to the contract. Mayor Halfacre anticipated that the property

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would be returned in better condition, but he wanted to have the option to renew the lease. Mayor Pro-Tem Livingston confirmed that more planting would start soon. She did not want to hold up the lease because she wanted the Town's Park Staff to have control over all the new plants going in at Lexington Square. Town Administrator Poole stated that the County did not want to include an automatic renewal, but it would be similar to where the County's Fire Station is located. He added that the County's main concern was to not have events during their court sessions. Mayor Halfacre agreed that the Town is fine now with the lease, but 20 years down the road, others may not agree. He requested that the lease be signed tonight, pending the County's First Reading tomorrow. Councilmember Maness asked why the lease started on October 1, 2012. In the absence of Municipal Attorney Cunningham, Town Prosecutor Koon stated that was probably the date when the lease negotiations had started. He recommended that the date be corrected when the lease is approved by both parties. Councilmember MacDougall stated that the October date was probably close to the time when the negotiations and work started at the park. Mayor Halfacre stated that the final lease would be dated around April, after Final Reading by the County. The motion was unanimously carried.

**NEW BUSINESS**

1. **First Reading of an Ordinance Annexing TMS #4496-01-009, 108 Hope Ferry Road:** MWK Properties, LLC, owns a property located near the corner of Hope Ferry Road and Sunset Boulevard and petitioned for annexation. The property is currently undeveloped. Properties in Town near these properties are zoned General Commercial (GC) and Hope Ferry Road is classified as a Collector Road. The Planning Commission will review this annexation during their March meeting.

A motion was made by Mayor Pro-Tem Livingston and seconded by Councilmember Stambolitis to approve First Reading of an Ordinance Annexing TMS #4496-01-009. The motion was unanimously carried.

2. **Larkin Woods Subdivision Request for cost Participation:** Essex Homes decided to proceed with the development of the Larkin Woods Subdivision, which is a 65 lot subdivision located at the intersection of Cromer Road and Mineral Springs Road. Mr. Frank Berry, with Essex Homes, requested that the Town participate with the off-site sewer for the subdivision. Per the Town's policy, Council can approve participation up to 25% of the CCF's for the project not to exceed the total cost of the off-site construction. The estimated off-site sewer cost is \$104,600.00. The total CCF's for the development will be \$240,500.00 and 25% of that will be \$60,125.00 or 16.25 CCF's. Participation will be made in the form of CCF credits.

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A motion was made Councilmember Maness and seconded by Mayor Pro-Tem Livingston to approve participation as requested. The motion carried with a vote of six (6) in favor and one (1) opposed (Frazier).

- 3. Request of Sewer Service Extension on Steeple Chase Road off Highway 378:** Mr. Shawn Graham, a resident on Steeple Chase Road, requested that the Town participate to extend sewer service to the residents in his neighborhood. He has been contacting his neighbors to see how many are interested in having sewer service brought into their area. Mr. Graham identified 16 property owners that want sewer service. The Town has participated in projects like this in the past with enough owners interested that prepaid CCF fees to cover the installation of the sewer extension (Hallmark Shores, Mallard Bay, and Driftwood Point). Another project was Power Point Lane where there was not enough interest to cover the installation cost but the property owners were willing to prepay for CCF's and pay additional cost to cover the installation. The estimated cost to run a new four inch force main to the last interested property would be approximately \$54,208.00. The prepaid CCF fees for the 16 properties would be \$59,200.00 if these property owners prepay. There is a potential for 42 new sewer services with this line extension that eventually would need to tie on to the Town's system due to septic tank failures. If there is not enough participation to complete the extension to the end of Steeple Chase Road, the project could be done in phases. Construction cost would be covered by prepaid CCF fees.

A motion was made Councilmember Stambolitis and seconded by Councilmember Frazier to approve the participation concept and allow the Utilities Department to work with the neighborhood to collect the CCF's to have the new lines installed. Councilmember Maness confirmed that the Town had not yet contacted the homeowners and the Town does not force neighborhood annexations. Councilmember Stambolitis recommended that a map be taken to show the homeowners. He added that it would be better environmentally to tie onto the Town's system. Town Administrator Poole stated that the contact letter would be modified to show that the Town boundary is approximately 4 ½ miles. Mr. Graham confirmed that he had heard from 16 homeowners out of 52 lots. The motion was unanimously carried.

- 4. It's All About Herbs Festival Request for Contribution:** The "Herb Bunch", a non-profit club affiliated with the Clemson Extension Service, is organizing its second "It's All About Herbs Festival". The festival will be held Saturday, April 13, 2013 on the grounds of the Lexington County Museum. Contributions will provide funds, not only for the festival organization itself but also for a scholarship to a Lexington County student for study in the agricultural or horticultural field. The levels of contributions and advertisements for the Town are as follows: Silver Level: \$150.00; Gold Level: \$250.00; Platinum Level: \$350.00 or more. Last year Council recommended a contribution of \$150.00 to

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the “It’s All About Herbs Festival”. During Council’s February 19, 2013 Work Session, a \$150.00 contribution was recommended.

A motion was made by Councilmember Frazier and seconded by Councilmember Stambolitis to approve a sponsorship to “It’s All About Herbs Festival” in the amount of \$150.00. Councilmember Stambolitis stated that anything that promotes tourism to downtown, no matter how big or small, helps promote the area. Councilmember Shevchik stated that herbs are essential to cooking. The motion was unanimously carried.

5. **Street Repairs Project:** At the January and February 2013 Work Sessions, the Street Repairs Project with a preliminary prioritized repair list and related matters were discussed. The flexible project list was intended to indicate the potential scope of repairs. Modification may be required based upon continuing engineering work and the ultimate results of the RFP. The primary concern is to identify cost effective approaches to address the repair needs. For example, a possible alternate approach to repair of Carnoustie Court will likely produce lower costs than originally expected. The approach could be applicable to other roads. Additionally, a joint bid (in whole or part) with the County may be possible which could reduce total costs and allow the Town to address repair needs on more roads than currently anticipated.

The overall plan will include Golden Hills Tax District funds of about \$195,000. Additionally, the Golden Hills HOA offered matching funds of \$100,000 to expand the Golden Hills portion of the project. Given the expected savings from the original estimate for Carnoustie Court, the additional allocation to Golden Hills’ roads necessary to match the HOA funds should have minimal impact on the original estimate for expenditures outside of Golden Hills. It is important to note that the ability to leverage the HOA matching funds with Tax District and Town funds will allow the most pressing needs Town-wide to be addressed when the possibility exists for significant economies of scale. This should lower future costs for the Town.

The attached Project Sources and Uses Budget provides for the 2013 GO BANs to contribute approximately \$630,000, Designed Streets and Infrastructure Funds approximately \$335,680, Golden Hills Special Purpose Tax District approximately \$195,000 and the Golden Hills HOA \$100,000 for a total overall project budget of \$1,260,680. Of this amount, \$100,000 will match the contribution from the Golden Hills HOA to expand the Golden Hills portion of the overall project.

A motion was made by Councilmember Shevchik and seconded by Councilmember Stambolitis to approve the Street Repair Project as stated, including acceptance of the Golden Hills HOA matching funds. Councilmember Stambolitis requested that the list be put on the Town’s web page. Town Administrator Poole recommended that it be placed on

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the web page after a bid is awarded and a time frame is obtained. He added that there are many different levels of repairs and homeowners would be notified accordingly. He stated that the County recently made \$50,000 available for road repairs which the Town has applied for a portion of the funds. Mayor Halfacre asked the County to remember that the Town of Lexington is still part of Lexington County. He thanked Becky Heskett, Marty Lefkowitz and Brad Arnold for attending the meeting and for the HOA matching contribution. Councilmember Maness hoped that dirt roads would soon be part of road repairs. Town Administrator Poole stated that there are approximately four dirt roads in Town and the one near the soccer field was in line to be paved. The motion was unanimously carried.

6. **LCRAC Moving for Meals Campaign Request for Sponsorship:** The Lexington County Recreation and Aging Commission's Council on Aging is kicking off the Twentieth Annual Moving for Meals Campaign to support the Meals on Wheels program and heighten awareness of the circumstances that face many of Lexington County's aging individuals. LCRAC requested support from the Town of Lexington. During Council's February 19, 2013 Work Session, a \$500.000 contribution was recommended.

A motion was made by Councilmember MacDougall and seconded by Mayor Pro-Tem Livingston to approve a contribution in the amount of \$500.00 to LCRAC's Moving for Meals Campaign. The motion was unanimously carried.

**COMMENTS**

**Mayor Randy Halfacre** wished Happy Birthday to all employees celebrating birthdays in March, especially Municipal Attorney Cunningham who celebrated a "big" birthday on Saturday. He wished Sherry Brooks (Finance Department) a speedy recovery from her recent surgery. He sent get well wishes to Assistant Finance Director Laraine Wieder's son who had surgery this morning. Mayor Halfacre stated that he looked forward to serving Meals on Wheels on March 13<sup>th</sup>. He announced a special Flashlight Easter Egg Hunt on March 22<sup>nd</sup> from 6:00 to 9:00 p.m. at the Gibson Road Soccer Complex. He added that this is a partnership with LCRAC and there will be over 50,000 eggs and carnival rides. Mayor Halfacre announced that the Town would seek public input on the new Town property development at the corner of Main and Church Streets. He added that dates and times would soon be available for a design workshop for Council, Staff and citizens to discuss the amphitheater, green space and plaza. Mayor Halfacre thanked Doug Lee and the Police Department's CAT Team for being on his radio show this week. He wished his puppy a Happy 1<sup>st</sup> Birthday. Mayor Halfacre recognized Mr. Scott Adams, High Flight Consultants, previously with Prysmian, who would now be working with many Prysmian companies across the country, but will continue to live in Lexington.

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**Mayor Pro-Tem Hazel Livingston** announced that the 4<sup>th</sup> Annual Wine Walk will be May 11<sup>th</sup> from 6:00 to 10:00 p.m. She stated that the Wine Walk benefits the Lexington Beautification Foundation. She added that they are looking for sponsors and food vendors for the event. Mayor Pro-Tem Livingston announced that Rob Dooley, Treasurer for Lexington Beautification Foundation, had approved another \$20,000 to finish landscaping at Lexington Square which still allows enough funds to put on the 2013 Wine Walk. Mayor Pro-Tem Livingston wished a Happy Birthday to her three daughters and her granddaughter.

**Councilmember Kathy Maness** enjoyed attending Lexington School District One Foundation's Excellence in Education last Thursday honoring the top 10% of District One's High School Seniors. She congratulated American Engineering for winning the Palmetto Engineering Award. She commended the Police Department for everything they do for the Town and she is proud to live in one of the safest towns in the State. She thanked Councilmember Shevchik for bringing the Resolution for Emma's Law and she hoped it would pass in the House of Representative and her prayers would continue to be with the Longstreet family. She was proud to see some of Lexington Police Officers at the State House last week when Emma's Law was read. She wished everyone a Happy Easter and Happy Spring.

**Councilmember Ted Stambolitis** thanked LCRAC's staff and volunteers for all they do for the elderly in the community. He added that they operate on a cut budget and can use all the support possible. He also thanked June Fusco at the Chris Myers' Childrens' Place. He added that Christ Central also runs the homeless Veteran's home near the Sheriff's office and they are truly doing God's work. Councilmember Stambolitis commended the Lexington Police Department and Chief Green for all the work they do to serve the community. He thanked David and Karen Longstreet for their work in bringing stricter DUI laws to the State. He wished a Happy Birthday to Brad, Stuart and Dan and added that the Town was lucky to have them. He also wished his son a Happy Birthday and his late Dad would have also celebrated his birthday in March.

**Councilmember Danny Frazier** thanked Chief Green and his Staff for having a great Police Department and they continue to shine. He also thanked Staff for always helping with solutions when at times Council comes at them with a lot of things.

**Councilmember Todd Shevchik** wished everyone a Happy Easter. He thanked the Longstreets for attending the meeting tonight. Even though it is difficult for them they are putting Emma's Law first. Councilmember Shevchik stated that he was very excited to see that many of the Town roads will be repaired. He wished to read all the names of the roads on the project list that would be repaired. He added that the roads were graded A to F by Dan Walker, with F grade being the first roads to be repaired. He stated that roads may be added later depending on the budget. He added that many citizens had complained about Ellis Avenue, next to the Post Office, but that is a private road and the owner lives out of the country. He stated that the Town would make attempts to get the owner to assume the responsibility of the road.

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**Councilmember Steve MacDougall** wished to concur with all the congratulatory comments already made by Councilmembers. He wished to add that the large trees near the intersection of West Main Street and Main Street were taken down for a reason and in addition to widening the road; some of the roots were also causing problems with construction. Mayor Pro-Tem Livingston added that replacement trees would be the type that do not cause root problems.

**Town Administrator Britt Poole** wished everyone a Happy Easter. He commended Patrolman Alewine on receiving the Medal of Valor. He added that he inspected the building the day after the fire and there was no doubt that had Patrolman Alewine not been there it would have resulted in a fatality.

**NEWS MEDIA**

**Ms. Tiffany Barkley**, Patch.com, asked if businesses would have to reapply for the two additional Façade Grants. Mayor Halfacre confirmed that the Town originally received 24 applications and the Board had approved to grant the next two businesses on the scored list.
