David McCaskill was honored for twenty-five years of service as a reserve officer at the June 2 Lexington Town Council meeting. Mayor Steve MacDougall and Chief Terrence Green presented David with an engraved cigar box and a painting of the McCaskill's Lake Wateree house. Chief Green also announced David's promotion to Sergeant over the Reserve Unit.

David was born in Camden, SC and educated in the Kershaw County school system. He attended Francis Marion College and started his first full time job in 1984 as a Disc Jockey and advertising sales rep with WPUB in Camden SC. Over the next three years David worked for Z 96 and C 103 in West Columbia. C 103 is the radio station where David first met a West Columbia police officer who stopped in at the station. Through this friendship David was introduced to the reserve program for the first time. In 1989, David was certified with the West Columbia Police Department and started his reserve career under Chief Vernon Boatwright. He worked with West Columbia PD from 1989 – 2003 and earned the rank of corporal.

In 2003, David moved to the town of South Congaree Police Department where he worked until 2007 and earned a rank of Lieutenant. David then moved to the Town of Lexington Police Department in 2007, where he continues to volunteer as a reserve officer when not busy managing his own commercial maintenance company that he started in 1987.

Besides his volunteer time with the Town of Lexington David also serves as the Chairman of the Lake Wateree Association and is an active member of First Baptist Church in Columbia. David has been married to his best friend Fran for 23 years and they have two children, Ashley a senior at Furman University and MaryBeth who will attend Clemson University in the fall. Their family enjoys spending time on Lake Wateree and traveling.

Chief Green stated: "we are very fortunate to have someone of David's character and with his experience who wants to volunteer his time with our police department. Reserve Officers don't just come in when they want, State Law Requires 20 Hours/Month or 60 Hours/Quarter with additional hours for annual training. We greatly appreciate David's twenty-five years of dedication and his loyalty to the Lexington Police Department."
